

Weather Summary- May 2012



Total rainfall for May 2012 at E.T. Joshua Airport-Arnos Vale, was 257.3 mm (10.11 inches). This was more than two times the May average of 114.4mm. A trough system interacting with the ITCZ resulted in flooding and landslides on the northeastern side of mainland St. Vincent on the 10th. (see figure 1). Then a tropical wave with moderate to isolated strong convection interacted with an upper level trough on the 23rd and 24th, resulted in small scale flooding and landslips in vulnerable areas. On the 30th, a weak tropical wave passed SVG with more showers. Maximum and minimum temperatures were lower than average 0.6 and 0.2 ° C respectively. (See Table 1). Occasionally, Saharan dust haze reduced visibility.

June History

On average, rainfall for June is 202.6mm with 19 rain-days. The average maximum temperature is 31.5°C, and average minimum temperature is 23°C. June marks the start of our rainy/hurricane season.

National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration forecast a near normal hurricane season with 9 to 15 storms; 4 to 8 becoming hurricanes, and 1 to 3 major hurricanes. Two storms (Alberto, Beryl) already named, were no threat to our islands.

Temperature Outlook

• Beyond June, expect an increase in air temperatures of about 0.5 °C. This may have negative implications, such as flower abscission. (Abscission process-a plant drops one or more of its parts).

Rainfall Outlook




Figure 2. Precipitation Outlook May-June-July 2012

- Extreme northern and western Caribbean, as well as Trinidad and Tobago, Guyana and Suriname...normal to above normal. (See figure 2)
- Cuba normal rainfall.
- Jamaica, Hispaniola, southeastward to the Lesser Antilles...normal to below normal.
